## INTRODUCING HIRALAL MAZUMDAR MEMORIAL COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

Hiralal Mazumdar Memorial College for Women, an institution dedicated for the empowerment of women, was founded by Biswarup Sevashram Trust in 1959, with the primary objective of providing University Education in a congenial atmosphere for deserving students irrespective of religion, caste and creed. It started functioning on 10th day of August, 1959 with just few students on the rolls in the undergraduate general courses of Bengali, English, Economics, History, Sanskrit, Political Science and Philosophy.

Today, there are 1326 students on roll in odd semesters studying in 27 U.G courses, out of which 18 U.G courses are taught as MAJOR (Honours) courses, three streams (Arts, Sciences and Commerce) and 21 Programmes. The College is now offering 36 special certificate/Add-on/Value added Courses to prepare students for global job market.

At present, 111 teaching staff members out of which 30 hold doctoral degree. There are 26 non-teaching staff in service, 04 security personnel for constant vigilance. Hiralal Mazumdar Memorial College for Women received full statutory recognition in 1999 by Government of West Bengal and came out of the control of Trust rule. The College was initially affiliated to University of Calcutta; since 2008 the College affiliation had been shifted to West Bengal State University, North 24-Parganas, Barasat. Though affiliated, the College leaves no stone unturned to frame its own course of action for academic upgradation and adopt innovative methods of teaching and evaluation.

UGC conferred the 2f and 12B status to the College in due course and the College is constantly trying to follow the path of excellence.

NAAC's re-accreditation score in 2023 (Third Cycle) is 3.33 CGPA (A+), which is a steep elevation from its previous status B++ and since then the prime moto of the College is to work harder to help the students evolve into competent, committed, creative and compassionate women with a bright future for their own and for the nation.

College Research Development Cell, Incubation centre, Institutional Innovation Council, Equal Opportunity Cell are trying their best to transform the College into a vibrant knowledge hub.

#### **LIBRARY RULES**

- In order to access the facilities of the Central Library, students must acquire library cards. Without proper library card no student will be allowed inside the library.
- The library card is NOT TRANSFERRABLE (i.e., students are not allowed to borrow books on the card of other members).
- Loss of Library cards must immediately be informed to the Librarian in writing, failing which the student concerned will be held responsible for all subsequent misuse of the same. A fine of Rs 20/- (Rupees twenty only) will be charged for issuing a duplicate card.
- A student can borrow one book at a time for 12 days and may be renewed once for the next 6 days only.
- For delay in returning books, students have to pay a fine of an amount of Re.1/(Rupee one only) per day per book. Sundays and holidays are exempted.
- Students are bound to replace lost or damaged books with the latest edition, failing which the current market price of the book will be realized from her.
- Students of all the semesters must return all the books at the right time.
- It is mandatory for EVEN SEMESTER STUDENTS to collect LIBRARY CLEARANCE CERTIFICATE from the library after their **end semester**

- examination by returning all books and surrendering library cards. Students need to show this certificate in the office before collecting mark sheet.
- The books marked as "NOT TO BE LENT OUT" and periodicals (both journals and magazines) are meant for consultation within reading room only and strictly not for home issue.
- Use of computer and internet is meant for learning purposes only. Browsing social networking site or obscene website, playing games, music, watching videos, downloading any kind of software are strictly prohibited
- Silence and strict discipline should be maintained in the reading-room. Other than reading and learning all other activities shall be treated as cases of misconduct.
- The Central Library is a NO-MOBILE ZONE.
- All the information related to Central Library will be published on the Notice Board specified for the library.
- Improper use of library facilities by a student may lead to suspension of library privileges or even cancellation of her membership.

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#### **ADMISSION REGULATIONS**

#### **Admission Qualifications**

- A candidate who has passed the "10+2" standard is eligible to seek admission to the First Semester of the Eight Semester B.A./B.Sc. (Hons) or in the First Semester of the Six-semester Multidisciplinary B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. The course of studies provided she has also passed in English with full marks not less than 100.
- No candidate, in general, shall be allowed for admission in the course after a lapse of more than 3 years from the year of passing the previous qualifying examination. The desirous applicant requires prior permission from the University authority. Students desiring admission to 3-year Multidisciplinary programme shall get a total lapse of not more than 6 years.
- The year of admission shall not be taken into account while calculating 3 years from the year of passing the previous qualifying examination.
- In exceptional cases a candidate may be allowed for admission after 3 years of the previous qualifying examination, but, within 3 years after discontinuation of a recognized regular Course of Study.
- Determining the eligibility for admission in the 4-year Honours Course, aggregate marks shall be calculated by adding the marks of the top four subjects in order of marks secured by a candidate at the "10+2" qualifying examination. However, marks in compulsory Environmental Education/Studies shall not be considered for calculating the aggregate marks. If the subject "Environmental Science" is studied as an elective subject of 100 marks, it may be taken into account for the purpose of determining the aggregate marks.
- Determining eligibility for admission to the 3-year Multidisciplinary UG programme of study will be the same as above.

# **Eligibility to apply for a Course**

A candidate taking up Honours or Multi-Disciplinary Programme must have obtained:

A minimum of 50% marks in the aggregate and 45% marks in the subject or related subject at the previous qualifying examination. In the case of Music (Hons.) 45% marks in the aggregate and 45% marks in the subject Music in the previous qualifying examination or 55% marks in the subject or related subject in the previous qualifying examination or 50% marks in the aggregate when the

- candidate has not studied the subject in her previous qualifying examination provided all other clauses are satisfied.
- ➤ Candidates belonging to the Scheduled Caste or Scheduled Tribe category must have obtained 40% marks in the aggregate and 40% marks in the subject/related subjects at the previous qualifying examination (10+2 level) for being eligible for admission in the Honours programme of study.
- ➤ Candidates applying for Multi-Disciplinary Course must have passed each subject & a minimum qualifying number in "10+2". Candidates willing to take Computer Science as General Subject must have passed Computer Science in the "10+2" standard. Candidates applying for Mathematics (Minor) she should have passed in Mathematics at the "10+2" level examination.
- > Students, who have passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) examination or its equivalent from all India Boards/Councils or State Boards/Councils including Open Schools and vocational studies, are eligible for study at the UG level.
- > Students who have passed "10+2" from All India Boards/Councils (viz. CBSE, ISC and National Institute of Open Schooling) are not required to submit the Migration Certificate for getting Registration under this University.
- ➤ Any dispute regarding eligibility criteria would be resolved by the Equivalence Committee set up by the University or by the Executive Council in its absence.
- ➤ The candidate (Foreign Nationals) will have to show "Original Copy" of Certificate of Madhyamik (or equivalent), Certificate of Higher Secondary (or equivalent) and original Passport (along with Student Visa) at the time of admission. Foreign Nationals will have to pay the fees five times higher than the Indian Nationals. Their papers must be duly endorsed by the local Embassies/Consulates/High Commissions, whichever is applicable and their visa period must cover the period required to complete the course.

# **Choice of Courses**

- A. 4-year UG (Honours) Course of Studies: Candidates will have to choose a single major discipline and any two minor disciplines along with the requisite numbers of AEC, SEC, MDC & VAC along with an internship. The combination of major and two minor disciplines for the students admitted in 4-year UG (Honours) will be decided by the college authority.
  - [\*\*Nomenclature of degree will be notified later on communication from UGC.]
- B. 3-Year Multidisciplinary Undergraduate (UG) programme of study: A candidate is required to choose any three subjects from one or two broad categories of disciplines as offered by the concerned college. She will be awarded a 3-year B.A./B.Sc./B. Com. in a particular discipline provided that at least two out of the three subjects chosen by her falls in that particular category.

A. For the 4 year UG Programme with Honours, a candidate is required to choose his/her Major in a discipline and two other disciplines for Minor courses, from among Group-I to Group-VIII as above by taking not more than one discipline from any of the groups mentioned above.

- B. For the 3 year Multidisciplinary Course of Studies, a candidate is required to choose any three Core subjects from among the broad category of disciplines as offered by the college. However, the choice of the three subjects will have to be made as stated hereunder:
  - a. For B.Sc. 3 year Multidisciplinary Programme, a candidate is required to choose three Core subjects from among Group I to VIII by taking not more than one subject from the same group and at least two science subjects.
  - b. For the B.A. 3 year Multidisciplinary Course of Studies, a candidate is required to choose three Core subjects from among Group I to VIII by taking not more than one subject from the same group and at least two 6 subjects from Humanities and Social Sciences.
  - c. For B.Com 3 year Multidisciplinary programme three core subjects to be chosen from Commerce and allied disciplines maintaining NEP norm.

# Some Special conditions for admission to Honours Courses are as follows:

To take up Honours in any subject, the candidate has to pass in that "subject" or "any related subject" in the H.S. examination. In the above table, in general, "subject" and "related subject" are given under columns A and B. However, the following restrictions supersede the previous clause.

## (i) Economics:

- A) A candidate shall be allowed to take up Honours in Economics if she has passed in Mathematics at the H.S. or its equivalent Examination. However, it is advisable that as student pursuing Honours in Economics takes Mathematics as a Generic Elective (for pursuing higher studies in the subject in future).
- **B)** A student shall be given B.Sc Honours degree in Economics if she takes up at least one discipline from the Science group for her Generic Elective and shall be awarded B.A Hons. degree in Economics if both the disciplines chosen for Generic Electives are from the Arts & Humanities group.

A student will be given B.Sc. degree in Economics if she earns required number of credits in the structure appropriate for B.Sc. General and chooses at least one discipline from science group besides Economics.

A student will be given B.A. degree in Economics if she earns required number of credits in the structure appropriate for B.A. General and chooses the other main discipline (and not the Generic Elective) from Arts & Humanities group, besides Economics.

- **ii) Education/Sociology:** Subjects Psychology, Philosophy, Mathematics, Sociology, Education, Economics, Political Science, History be treated as related subject.
- **iii) Philosophy:** Subjects Psychology, Education, History, Political Science, Sociology be treated as related subject.
- **iv) Food and Nutrition:** A candidate shall be allowed to take up Honours in Food and Nutrition if she has passed Chemistry at the H.S. Examination and has to take up Chemistry as one of the elective subject.

A student will only be given the B.Sc. degree for Food and Nutrition subject. It is mandatory for the student to choose both the subjects from the Science group to be eligible for the aforesaid degree.

For the rest of the criteria, candidates are requested to go through the Admission Regulation as posted under the Online Centralized Admission Portal.

# MORE ABOUT THE NEW CURRICULUM AND THE FUNCTION OF OUR INSTITUTION

# MAJOR AND MINOR DISCIPLINES

Major discipline is the discipline or subject of main focus and the degree will be awarded in that discipline. Students should secure the prescribed number of credits (about 50% of total credits) through core courses in the major discipline.

Minor discipline helps a student to gain a broader understanding beyond the major discipline.

# **MULTIDISCIPLINARY COURSE (MDC)**

All UG students are required to undergo 3 introductory-level courses relating to any of the broad disciplines given below. These courses are intended to broaden the intellectual experience and form part of liberal arts and science education. Students are not allowed to choose or repeat courses already undergone at the higher secondary level (12th class) in the proposed major and minor stream under this category.

# ABILITY ENHANCEMENT COURSE (AEC)

Students are required to achieve competency in a modern Indian language and in the English language with special emphasis on language and communication skills. These courses aim at enabling the students to acquire and demonstrate core linguistics skills, including critical reading and expository and academic writing skills, that help students articulate their arguments and present their thinking clearly and coherently.

# SKILL ENHANCEMENT COURSE

These courses are aimed at imparting practical skills, hands-on-training, soft skills to enhance the employability of the students.

# **VALUE ADDED COURSE**

These are courses that will help develop all capacities of human beings – intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional, and moral in an integrated manner. Each of these courses carries 3 credits.

### **INTERNSHIP**

The internship is intended to provide opportunities for students to actively engage in on-site experiential learning. The student has the option to complete a 2-credit summer internship in a lab, industrial organization, R & D lab, or through community engagement, NSS, NCC as organized by the college. The student must complete a 2-credit summer internship by his/her 5th semester of study. Our college provides the best of the options in this respect in association with top NAAC-rated Colleges and esteemed Institutions.

### CREDIT HOURS FOR DIFFERENT TYPES OF COURSES

- The workload relating to a course is measured in terms of credit hours.
- Each course may have only a lecture component or a lecture and tutorial component or a lecture and practicum component or a lecture, tutorial, and practicum component, or only a practicum component.
- Per week a one-credit course in practicum or lab work, community engagement and services, and fieldwork in a semester mean two-hour engagement. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a one-credit practicum in a course is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.
- A one-credit of Seminar or Internship or Field practice/project or Community engagement and service means two-hour engagements per week. Accordingly, in a semester of 15 weeks duration, one credit in these courses is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.
- A course can have a combination of lecture credits, tutorial credits, and practicum credits.

# ➤ Lab- based Subject

Theory-3 credits (45 Hours); Practical-2 credits (30x2=60 Hours), Tutorial-1 credit (15 Hours).

### > Non Lab- based Subject

Theory-4 credits (60 Hours); Tutorial-1 credit (15 Hours), Field Work-1 credit (30 Hours).

### **DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME**

The duration of the UG programme (Honours) is 4 years or 8 semesters. Students who desire to undergo a 3-year UG Programme will be allowed to exit after completion of the 3rd year. Students may be permitted to take a break from the study during the period of study but the total duration for completing the programme shall not exceed 7 years. The duration of Multidisciplinary UG Programme is 3 years.

### **SWAYAM COURSES**

The University may allow up to 20% of the total courses being offered in a particular program in a Semester through the online learning courses offered through SWAYAM platform. However, the candidate will have to seek permission from the university, if she wants to replace regular class teaching with SWAYAM course. Swayam courses will

be allowed only for SEC, MDC and VAC but not for Major and Minor disciplines.

# QUALIFICATION LEVELS AND CREDIT REQUIREMENTS

For 4 years UG Honours minimum credit requirement is 180, whereas, for 3 years multidisciplinary programme the minimum credit requirement is 125.

## POST- ADMISSION STIPULATIONS

The college has the freedom to hold any number of tests and examinations of their own students in the form of class tests or preparatory tests or open-book tests whatever may be required for the betterment of the students.

It is expected that the semester examinations will be held every six months as per the academic calendar which will be duly intimated in advance by the University.

Academic Calendars and Academic monitors are prepared by every department to ensure academic accuracy and accountability. Under the supervision of Academic subcommittee academic accounting is done on regular basis to assure quality in transmission of knowledge to the students. Completion of syllabus by the faculty members within the stipulated time and continuous evaluation, remedial classes and classes for the advanced learners are scheduled to upgrade the quality of teaching learning. Internal examinations are also mentioned before the commencement of the academic session.

#### **RE-ADMISSION**

In case of discontinuation of Studies, the candidate concerned can be permitted only fresh admission with the issuance of new Registration (in cancellation of the earlier registration) after submission of an affidavit from a 1st class Judicial Magistrate that he/she has not taken admission under any other University/Institution in the intervening period. All such 15 cases of fresh admission have to be preceded with the cancellation of earlier registration. For all such re-admission the provisions of this regulation in consonance with the Act and Statute of the University and the guidelines issued by the West Bengal Higher Education Council from time to time should be followed. However, after an exit at the end of the 3rd year after completion of stipulated 6 semesters, the candidate will not have to re-register if he wants to complete the course within 7 years from the date of exit.

### **COLLEGE TRANSFER**

Transfer of candidates from one affiliated college to another will be possible as per the provisions laid out in the regulation of NEP 2020 based CCFUP system which will be in force at the relevant time. However, in all cases such transfers will be effected after due approval of the application of the candidate concerned along with requisite non-refundable fees to the University administration without contravening the provisions of the Regulation in force. All applications for transfer have to be made to the University authority within 30 consecutive days of commencement of the relevant semester. The applications must also contain the attendance of the student in that semester. The University reserves the right to approve or reject

such applications of transfer and it cannot be treated as a matter of right on behalf of the applicant concerned.



Apart from the above mentioned patent, more or less 40 patents have been granted in different domain of science and technology to our faculties.


# **INCUBATION CENTRE**

Incubation Centre started its course by performing through three units, as resolved in the meeting of RDC on 17.02. 2022. **The units are Handmade Jewellery-Making, Arts & Crafts, Painting and Modern Arts**. It was resolved that each unit would be a certificate course/ Add-on course to be offered to the students and prayer will be sent to the affiliating university for approval of the same.

Incubation Centre of HMMCW entered into an agreement with P. N. Das College, Sree Chaitanya Mahavidyalaya and New Alipore College on 13.04.2022 to work in mutual interest of with the idea of collaboration in the exploration and development of entrepreneurship in emerging areas. On 07.06.2022, this agreement was renewed to cover a wider area of innovation and the following **objectives** were highlighted:

- To facilitate students and faculties to participate in start-up courses aimed at promoting of innovative ideas.

In pursuance to the Judgment of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India dated 08.05.2009 in Civil Appeal No. 887/2009, the University Grants Commission has framed "UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of ragging in higher educational Institutions. 2099" which have been notified on 4th July, 2009 in the Gazatte of India. These regulations are mandatory for Universities/Institutions. The UGC has made it mandatory for all students / parents to submit anti ragging related affidavits to the institutions at the time of admission. Now it is brought to the notice of all Universities, Institutions, Students and Parents that these affidavits can be downloaded from the web site of UGC and or related other web sites.

#### SUPREME COURT OF INDIA

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS

An elaborate report has been submitted by the Committee headed by Dr. R.K. Raghavan. According to the Committee, the following factors need to be focused to tackle with the problem:

- a. Primary responsibility for curbing ragging rests with academic institutions themselves.
- b. Ragging adversely impacts the standards of higher education.
- c. Incentives should be available to institutions for curbing the menace and there should be disincentives for failure to do so.
- d. Enrolment in academic pursuits or a campus life should not immunize any adult citizen from penal provisions of the laws of the land.
- e. Ragging needs to be perceived as failure to inculcate human values from th schooling stage.
- f. Behavioural patterns among students, particularly potential 'Raggers', need to be identified.
- g. Measures against ragging must deter its recurrence.
- h. Concerted action is required at the level of the school, Higher Education institution, District administration, University. State and General Governments to make any curb effective.
- i. Media and the Civil Society should be involved in this exercise.

The Committee has made several recommendations. For the present, we feel that the following recommendations should be implemented without any further lapse of time.

- 1. The punishment to be meted out has to be exemplary and justifiably harsh to act as a deterrent against recurrence of such incidents
- 2. Every single incident of ragging where the victim or his parent/guardian or the Head of institution is not satisfied with the institutional arrangement for action, a First Information Report must be filed without exception by the institutional authorities with the local police authorities. Any failure on the part of the institutional authority or negligence or deliberate delay in lodging the FIR with the local police shall be construed to be an act of culpable negligence on the part of the institutional authority. If any victim or his parent/guardian of ragging intends to file FIR directly with the police, that will not absolve the institutional authority from the requirement of filing the FIR.
- 3. Courts should make an effort to ensure that cases involving ragging are taken up on a priority basis to send the correct message that ragging is not only to be discouraged but also to be dealt with sternness.
- 4. In addition, we direct that the possibility of **introducing in the educational curriculum a subject relating to ragging** shall be explored by the National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) and the respective State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT). This aspect can be included in the teaching of the subjects "Human Rights".
- 5. In the prospectus to be issued for admission by educational institutions, it shall be clearly stipulated that in case the applicant for admission is found to have indulged in ragging in the past or if it is noticed later that he has indulged in ragging, admission may be refused or he shall be expelled from the educational institution.
- 6. The Central Government and the State Governments shall launch a programme giving wide publicity to the menace of ragging and the consequences which follow in case any student is detected to have been involved in ragging.
- 7. It shall be the **collective responsibility of the authorities and functionaries of the concerned institution** and their role shall also be open to scrutiny for the purpose of finding out whether they have taken effective steps for preventing ragging and in case of their failure, action can be taken; for example, denial of any grant-in-aid or assistance from the State Governments.
- 8. Anti-ragging committees and squads shall be forthwith formed by the institutions and it shall be the job of the committee or the squad, as the case may be, to see that the Committee's recommendations, more particularly those noted above, are observed without exception and if it is noticed that there is any deviation, the same shall be forthwith brought to the notice of this Court.
- 9. The Committee constituted pursuant to the order of this Court shall continue to monitor the functioning of the anti-ragging committees and the squads to be formed. They shall also monitor the implementation of the recommendations to which reference has been made above.


